Given that the latest government figures show that in June 2021 there had been 31,410 applications for the EU Settlement Scheme then it is the opinion of the Insight Team that the ONS figure **significantly undercounts the number of non-UK born residents in Hull.**


² This figure has now been changed from the ONS BRES estimate of employee jobs to the ONS jobs density estimate. This means it now includes employees, self-employed, and government supported trainees.

³ We are no longer provided with crime data directly from Humberside Police so data is now sourced from the national police data website. This has meant that the previous Violent Crimes indicator has had to be updated to Violence and Sexual offences.

⁴ Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the summer exam series was cancelled in 2020. Pupils scheduled to sit GCSE and A/AS level exams in 2020 were awarded either a centre assessment grade (based on what the school or college believed the student would most likely have achieved had exams gone ahead) or their calculated grade using a model developed by Ofqual - whichever was the higher of the two. Each of the pupil level attainment statistics have increased - more than would be expected in a typical year - between the 2018/19 and 2019/20 academic years. This reflects the change to the way GCSE grades were awarded rather than improvements in pupil performance. As a result the 2019/20 data should not be directly compared to attainment data from previous years for the purposes of measuring changes in student performance.

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
