Proposals to Enforce Ferensway Yellow Box Junctions

2023 Summary Results

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BACKGROUND

In May 2023, Hull City Council's People's Panel were asked to tell us about where and which moving traffic violations are an issue.

As a result of this research with local residents, we are proposing that we apply for enforcement powers, in partnership with Humberside Police.

This survey asked residents for their views about proposals to enforce yellow box junctions on Ferensway.

Moving traffic violations have historically only been enforceable by the police. New powers were provided to local authorities to enforce moving traffic offences.

Initially, the Council proposes using the powers to enforce against illegal entry into yellow boxes at the route into the interchange from Brook Street, over Ferensway, into Margaret Moxon Way (the Interchange). There are yellow box junctions on both sides of the carriageway.

It is proposed that additional cameras are installed to identify drivers that breach restrictions.

Enforcement of these yellow box junctions is currently done solely by Humberside Police.

In the first 6 months of operation, offenders will be issued with a *warning* penalty charge notice (PCN) via post to the 'Registered Keeper' of the vehicle.

This will be a £0 penalty. Any further violations will be issued with a £70 penalty charge notice.

When a penalty charge notice is issued, details on how a challenge can be made will be provided. This must be in writing and within the timescales set out on the PCN.

For the first six months of operation warning notices will be sent for first time offences.

METHODOLOGY AND RESPONSE RATE

The survey ran from 27 July 2023 to 11 September 2023

The survey and consultation documents were circulated primarily electronically as a supplementary survey to the People's Panel and were published on the Hull Data Observatory and on the Hull City Council YourSay website.

Overall, 331 responses were received, of which:
